
Dear Sharon Faithful,

To begin Holy Week, we will wave our palms, lay down our coats and celebrate Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem saying, "*Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!*" In Easter, we will proclaim the resurrection, celebrating "*Hallelujah! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!*" reminding us that God's action in raising Jesus is the bottom line of our faith: because he lives, we live (Jn 14:19).

Yet, before Jesus' entrance into Jerusalem and during his journey to the cross and resurrection, Jesus was not celebrating what would come, he was preparing for it. In the Gospel of Matthew, he said to God through his grief and prayer, "*Not as I will, but as you will.*" He surrendered—one of the hardest things for us to do.

One of the most special gifts God has given to us is our own will. Each of us is relatively free to make different choices, to cause things to happen that otherwise would not occur and to act for good or for evil. This is how critical our will is.

Since 2020 and throughout the pandemic, it seems like too many of us have elevated the power of our own will and lost sight of Christ-like surrender in a rush to personal victories. Our relationships have grown more contentious or polarized, and some have used the banner of God's will to




bolster their own positions on everything from politics to vaccination at the demise and expense of our communities and bonds of friendship and love.

Yet, Jesus did not gain victory in new life and resurrection without first, surrendering his will. And at

the heart of our journey as Christ's followers, lies learning how to surrender our will to God's will.

Jesus models surrender for us in the Garden of Gethsemane when he asks God to "*Let this cup pass, not as I will, but as you will.*" In Jesus' surrender, he was not giving up hope in God's goodness, but letting go of his own grief

and distress. In his surrender, he dared to imagine a place of peace in God's plan that enabled him to love, to heal, to maintain his relationships and to care for others even as the cross loomed.

Beloved, surrendering our will to God does not mean that we then have no will of our own. Nor does surrender equate to mere resignation or passivity. Rather, it means that God will meet us in our deepest desire and grant us a peace that passes all understanding. It is an Easter peace, a resurrection peace, a new-life peace, a holy peace that will help us to listen, discern, love and care for others as we move through our struggles and act upon what God wants for our lives.

Let us surrender and celebrate this Easter that Christ has risen not just for us, but for all! Hallelujah! Christ has risen indeed!

Friday, April 15th Noon to 3:00 PM





SCPC Updated Masking Guidance

On February 25th, the CDC updated their COVID19 masking advisory. They moved their health advisory from masking to *prevent transmission of disease* to masking based on our area's *hospitalizations and ability to sufficiently treat the disease*—called “community risk.” In our area, we are now in the “low” level category of community risk.

At Sharon Church, we have faithfully followed the CDC guidelines for public safety, therefore, Session voted to remove masking requirements and move to the recommended “[mask optional](#)” guidance at most church events, keeping in place other safety measures.

Please read carefully the updated SCPC Campus Safety Guidelines:

- **Masking Optional:** Following the CDC guidelines, masking is optional at church events and gatherings.
- **Masking Sometimes:** Small groups may self-determine masking preferences at their gatherings.
- **Masking Always:** Front office masking.

Other safety measures: Continue practicing social distancing when possible, including worship. We also *recommend* continued masking for those who are at high risk of infection or immunocompromised.

Finally, please stay at home if you are feeling unwell or have been exposed to illness. Covid19 tests are now widely available for you to test before coming to church. Please note: at-home Covid testing will only work when you are symptomatic of infection, yet, you are contagious three (3) days *before* you show symptoms.



Given the demographic of our community, many in our community will continue to be masking. Additionally, there may be times that we may all need to return to masking depending on community disease numbers. Yet, in every circumstance, please respect the masking choices of *all* of our brothers and sisters in Christ as we make our way through this pandemic and care for one another in Christian love.



Deacons' Message

We have all been sending prayers over to Ukraine as the War continues to weigh heavily on our hearts. Many of us are praying for the Russians as well, because they too, are victims in this crisis. As I was reading articles on the Ukrainian-Russian war, there was something very powerful that I came across, and a message that was so breathtaking. That message was: ***The world is still united in the Lord.***

The Ukrainian Church is still talking with other church leaders in Russia and also praying together. They are praying for peace and also coming together to pray for bodies to be spared, along with their souls. They are united with the Lord and coming together in solidarity of God's word, and the people are coming together seeking hope through the word of Scripture.

"God's word can reconcile enemies, drive out despair and heal suffering hearts." That is the Ukrainian church's vision right now, and even as they are under siege, they are using the power of the Gospel to comfort and reassure their people's aching hearts.

The Ukrainian church said that as hundreds of thousands of people are feeling hopeless and afraid, they are looking to bible-based trauma healing to cope with the uncertainty. For a lot of people, this is the first time that they are experiencing the Bible's message for the first time.

Priests and Pastors have been going to the bible society store in Kyiv to buy Bibles and they are running out of copies. This is a first for them.

The Power of God is strong and so comforting to everyone that needs Him right now. He unites us, and always will. He is a common ground for people. Even through extreme circumstances, we are all united through the Lord.

Emergency response to Ukraine war



As the violence in Ukraine continues, the number of people being displaced internally and fleeing to neighboring countries increases by the day. And in the midst of the chaos, there are sibling churches and ecumenical partners who are already providing assistance with basic items for survival. Our first priority is to provide funding to these partners on the ground.

While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work. Our response will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.

Over the past several months, the Finance and Property Committees have been actively engaged in developing financial and property strategic plans for Sharon Church. This process involves a detailed review of our assets, including the buildings on our church campus, the cemetery, and the investment funds we hold to meet our needs in the coming years.

An important part of this process is a careful assessment of required building maintenance, property improvements and the utilization of our church campus by the congregation and community.

Main Campus

As you are surely aware, our buildings are aging and require significant ongoing maintenance. The Property Committee has put together a detailed list of maintenance projects that are expected to be necessary over the next ten years. One of the most important items on that list is the upgrade of the main building's electrical systems which are original to the building and, in many cases, fail to meet current electrical codes. We are now in the process of having our electric updated after having pursued these repairs for over two years. Additional projects under consideration are the air conditioning of the sanctuary and Fellowship Hall, parking lot and driveway improvements, and cemetery property improvements.



Cemetery



With regard to the cemetery, we have transitioned management and oversight of the SCPC Cemetery to the Finance and Property Committees. The former *Cemetery Board* who, for many years, was responsible for the management of the cemetery, was unable to maintain board members to provide the leadership, upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery grounds. So, they asked that Session please assume responsibility for the management of the Cemetery. The consolidation of the former Cemetery Board's functions was seen as a good fit for the Finance and Property Committees.

Now, the Finance Committee is responsible for oversight of the Cemetery Investment Fund held in trust with the Presbyterian Foundation. It continues to be a designated fund used solely for upkeep and maintenance of the cemetery property. The Property Committee, which has always managed the church grounds, will now also be responsible for maintaining the cemetery grounds. We have already begun to address the long-delayed upkeep and improvement of the cemetery grounds. We have secured a new grounds maintenance company to improve the quality and care of our outdoor spaces, hired a tree service to cut down the many large, aging trees and are having the cemetery surveyed in order to digitize new cemetery documents and records of burials. Finally, we have plans to create new fencing and seating in the cemetery and update the parking and access roads.

YCC

Building utilization is also an important consideration in the financial strategic review process. The hope is that the YCC facility can become fiscally self-sustaining, meaning that the cost of operating the building may be paid for by the revenue generated by those using the property. Rental rates for community groups using the gymnasium and YCC lounge have been set at levels comparable to similar facilities in our area. Gym rentals declined significantly during Covid, but we are now starting to see a return of some of the community groups to the YCC. Additionally, we have been renovating the YCC Lounge area for community use and Dave Michaels has set-up a Pickleball Court in the gym to encourage new users



The West Hills Food Pantry which operates as a separate non-profit organization from the church and occupies the lower level of the YCC, has paid a nominal monthly fee for the past three years to cover a small portion of its operational expenses. In 2022, we increased their monthly fees in order to cover a greater portion of their expenses. For nearly 35 years, Sharon Church has been able to provide the full financial support for the operational expenses of WHFP, however, as the Food Pantry has grown, so have their expenses. Fortunately, today, they have their own revenue streams and investment fund resources that will enable them to provide for their operational expenses. SCPC remains the largest benefactor of the WHFP and will continue to fundraise for the Food Pantry with multiple giving opportunities throughout the year.

Investment Funds

Finally, the Finance Committee is in the process of reviewing our long-term investment funds to ensure that the underlying investments are structured appropriately to support the church's needs. Included in this process is the evaluation of possible funding sources for larger capital expenditures, such as borrowing, capital campaigns, and use of available investment funds.

As you can see, there is a lot going on with Finance and Property! We will keep you informed of the progress we are making and you should be able to see some of our campus improvements now as well as the steps we will be taking very soon.

YCC Lounge and Gym



Part of our strategic plan is to update our church campus and thoughtfully utilize the space we have available. Therefore, we have cleaned out and updated the community room in the foyer area of the YCC, and are calling it the YCC Lounge!

The YCC Lounge will accommodate up to 25 people and is available to both church members for personal use as well as to community members for community use. All rentals and scheduling of this space must be arranged with our Church Administrator, Anna Laufer.

The best way to schedule and make arrangements for the use of the YCC Lounge is to email Anna at admin@sharoncpc.com. Anna will send you a contract to setup your day and time. Anna will issue you an access code for the day and time schedule which you can use to enter the YCC.

- Members may use the YCC Lounge and Gym free of charge if they are using it for personal use. This is a great space to host a child's Birthday party!
- Use of the YCC facilities for community purposes—such as team sports—practices or games, community events, clubs or parties—will accrue fees of \$45.00/hr. for the Gym and \$35.00/hr. for the Lounge.



Community groups who use the YCC Gym and/or YCC Lounge must provide Proof of Insurance via a Certificate of Liability from their Insurance Company. Members who use the space for a church-related or personal event will be covered under the church's insurance.

Both church members and community members using the YCC will be responsible for having attendees complete a Covid-19 Waiver Form, AND completing the 'Sign In/Out' Form, which are available in the YCC entryway. These basic

contracts and procedures help to facilitate communication between the church and all users, and keep our facilities in good working order.

If you are looking for a space to gather, host an event or play some ball, please contact Anna Laufer and she will be glad to work with you to set up your event.





Dear SCPC Members,

In the Book of Acts, when the church was in its infancy, the early disciples found a need to commission more leaders because they needed help building up the church and caring for God’s people. In Acts 6:3, the disciples said, “Therefore, friends, select from among yourselves seven people of good standing full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this task.” So, in this season of Easter as we celebrate new life in Christ, we will do as the early disciples did and raise up new leaders in the church.

In April and May, your Nominating Committee is soliciting your recommendations for church officers—Deacons and Elders—along with future nominating committee members. 

2022 Nominating Process



Church Officers

- Offering your gifts and talents given by God to further the church's mission and ministry.
- Active participation in the worship and mission of Sharon Church.
- Active participation in respective boards including meetings, leadership and planning for ministry and mission.
- Serve for a three-year term.
- A discerning spirit: openness to explore God at work among us and new forms of service to God.
- Willingness to graciously work and care for one another.
- Commitment to collaborate with other officers, committees, members and the pastor.
- Uphold appropriate confidentiality regarding care for our church members and the business of the church.

ELDERS Leading, Shepherding, Teaching.

- **Elders**, together with the minister, constitute the Session. Session is responsible for discerning the mission and spiritual direction of the congregation and is the final authority in the decision-making for the congregation.
- Leadership or co-leadership of a committee, team, or workgroup of church members responsible for a specific aspect of the congregation's mission and ministry, such as Worship, Christian Formation, Finance, Property and Maintenance, Generosity, and Mission.
- The Session acts as the Trustee or legal corporate body of Sharon Church.

DEACONS Leading through Serving.

- **Deacons** nurture spiritual growth in our congregation as well as foster care and fellowship among God's people.
- They care for the congregation inside and beyond the church walls in ministries of compassion and care.
- They coordinate and lead various ministries, such as, weekly fellowship after church, home communion, meals, rides, medical equipment, visitation, funeral receptions, cards, and flowers.
- Deacons are the hands and feet of Jesus. If you have a caring heart, please consider serving the church as a deacon.

Recommendation for Church Officers and Nominating Members

*And I heard the voice of the Lord saying,
"Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?"
Then I said, "Here I am! Send me." - Isaiah 6:8*

Thank you to everyone who generously donated to the West Hills Food Pantry during Lent. The Food Pantry began here at Sharon Church over 35 years ago and has grown from a canned goods distribution effort to feed unemployed steel workers to a community grocer who distributes fresh fruits, vegetables, meats and cheeses as well as household goods to any who are in need.
